
Lifelong learners with open minds

We aim to ensure that all our pupils achieve their full potential and we have high expectations of our children in all aspects of their development.

As a whole school we are working hard this year on improving our children's positive learning behaviours. Our aim is to improve children's intrinsic motivation and help them to become more resilient and independent in their learning.

Rewards - Merit point system

At Harrison we award merit points for positive learning behaviour falling into the 4 strands of Citizenship, Attitude to learning, Responsibility and Excellence. Children collect merit points on their merit card or chart to work towards their bronze, silver, gold, platinum and head teacher's award certificates.



Altendance

Regular attendance and punctuality are vital for good progress and we expect all children's attendance to be 97%. Attendance is shown as a percentage figure and we have detailed research below that shows how attendance, even at this early stage of education, affects outcomes for children at GCSE. We hope the tables below illustrate for you the importance of good attendance; this includes avoiding taking holidays during term time. If your child had less than 97% attendance, we would urge you to ensure their attendance improves this year.

Lateness

Children can enter the school playground at 8:45am through the main playground gate and go straight into their classrooms where their class teachers will be waiting for them. Please ensure your child is in school on time.

Please note that our morning session begins as soon as the children are registered at 8.55 and children missing this time miss out on valuable curriculum time such as guided reading and spelling.

School Uniform

We believe that children who take care and pride in the way they look also take pride in their work. The school encourages all pupils to identify with the school dress code as this engenders a sense of belonging. We ask for parental co-operation in ensuring that pupils are suitably dressed, and that high standards regarding school uniform will continue.

Please be aware that in line with our secondary feeder school, extreme hair styles are not encouraged. We would really appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

School uniform consists of:

- Grey/Black trousers, shorts, skirts or pinagore dresses
- Pale blue blouses, shirts or polo shirts
- Blue sweatshirts, cardigans and/or fleeces
- In summer children may wear blue and white candy stripe or gingham dresses
- Trainers preferably dark in colour (School shoes are not needed)
- On PE days children should come to school in their PE kit; plain navy, black or grey jogging bottoms, white t-shirts (No brands or logos please other than the school logo).



Jewellery

No jewellery, apart from watches and sleepers or studs in pierced ears only, should be worn to school. Jewellery should be removed for all physical education activities and the child must take responsibility for their possessions. We appreciate that this may be difficult for some children and so we recommend they leave earrings and watches at home on P.E. days. Smart watches can not be worn during PE sessions.

Make-up and Nail Varnish— is not permitted to be worn.

Home learning

Home learning each week will consist of:

- One piece of maths home learning. This will be a consolidation of what they have been learning in class.
- One curriculum piece (usually spelling or grammar related) which will link to another area of their learning.
- Times Tables practise on Times Table Rockstars
- Reading daily

The emphasis is on children self marking although we will be checking and setting verbal next steps and awarding merit points.

Fruit, vegetables, cheese, cream crackers or bread may be eaten at school break time.


Nut Allergies

Although, there isn't a reading diary that goes home now that the children are in year 4, we would still expect the children to be reading daily — independently or to an adult. Please talk to your child about their reading regularly.

Children read daily in school and they will visit the library regularly to choose their own books. Some children will also bring home levelled reading books. Please ensure the books that children choose to read at home are challenging enough for them.

This is what a secure piece of Year 4 writing looks like:




Addition and subtraction — column method up to 4 digit numbers. These are the written methods
that we teach in year 4




Maths

Multiplication — Children will use the grid method to multiply 2 digit and 3 digit numbers by I digit numbers or they will use the column method.





Division — children will use the chunking method on a number line for dividing 2 digit or 3 digit numbers by 1 digit or they will use the bus stop method.

Internet and E-safety

E safety continues to be a priority at Harrison and when the children are at home. This includes using: You Tube, Instagram, Facebook, Twitter, Tik Tok, email and gaming platforms.

The minimum age to open an account on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pintrest, Tumblr, Kik and Snapchat is 13. You Tube requires account holders to be 18 but a 13 year old can sign up with a parent's permission.

Despite these clearly stated and published age restrictions, large and growing numbers of children 12 and under are using social media networks often with their parent's knowledge and consent.
